V9 Agreement

FAFSA—must be completed to access other funds. Financial Aid given on a first come/first served basis. Must be completed every year. Must get a PIN before or during the application process. Beginning in Jan. (http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/)

Independent Student Status (FAFSA)— through the College Costs Reduction Act, any youth adopted on or after their 13th birthday is considered "independent" on the FAFSA and does not have to provide parent info (income) or signatures.

ETV Funds—available through DHHS for youth adopted on or after their 16th birthday. Must complete FAFSA. The college or training program must be accredited. Student must be in good academic standing. Some federal restrictions for use of funds. Awards vary depending on available funds & student need after other financial aid, scholarships and student refunds are determined, up to \$5000. Tuition Waiver—youth who were adopted from foster care AND whose parents are receiving an adoption subsidy from DHHS can apply for one of the 30 waivers that can be used at State of Maine Universities, Community Colleges, or Maine Maritime. Awarded on first come, first served basis—apply early. Must be a Maine resident. Must reapply each year. Available for undergraduate degrees only, up to 5 years. Application available Feb. 1. Administered through FAME (www.famemaine.com)

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Independent Student Status (FAFSA)—
through the College Costs Reduction Act,
any youth in Permanent Guardianship on
or after their 13th birthday is considered
"independent" on the FAFSA and does not
have to provide parent info (income) or
signatures.

ETV Funds—available through DHHS for youth who enter permanent guardianship on or after their 16th birthday. Must complete FAFSA. The college or training program must be accredited. Student must be in good academic standing.

Some federal restrictions for use of funds. Awards vary depending on available funds & student need after other financial aid, scholarships and student refunds are determined, up to \$5000. Youth who receive ETV funds at age 21 can receive them until age 23. Contact Dulcey Laberge 624-7928,

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Independent Student Status (FAFSA)—
through the College Costs Reduction
Act, any youth in foster care on or
after their 13th birthday is considered
"independent" on the FAFSA.

ETV Funds—available through DHHS for youth who have a signed V9 agreement. Must complete FAFSA. The college or training program must be accredited. Student must be in good academic standing. Some federal restrictions for use of funds. Awards vary depending on available funds & student need after other financial aid, scholarships and student refunds are determined, up to \$5000. Youth who receive ETV funds at age 21 can receive them until age 23. (Contact your local Youth Transition Worker or Caseworker)

Tuition Waiver— youth who were in foster care at the time of graduation or GED can apply for one of the 30 waivers that can be used at State of Maine Universities, Community Colleges, or Maine Maritime. Awarded on first come, first served basis—apply early. Must be a Maine resident. Must reapply each year. Available for undergraduate degrees only, up to 5 years. Application available Feb. 1. Administered through FAME

College Scholarship Opportunity

College Scholarships Are Available for Youth Adopted at 12 and Older from U.S. Foster Care

UMPS CARE Charities has partnered with The Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption (DTFA) and Slate XP to offer the UMPS CARE Charities All-Star Scholarship. All-Star Scholarships are open to children adopted from U.S. foster care at the age of 12 years or older. Funding will provide \$5,000 scholarships for a two-year institution or \$10,000 scholarships for a four-year institution.

Treatment Foster Care Agency: SMART Child & Family Services

Smart Child and Family Services, better known as "SMART", was founded in 1995 by a few foster parents. Since its conception, SMART has been committed to excellence in foster care. SMART's family-centered approach focuses on professional development and intensive support for foster parents and children. Our goal is to provide a therapeutic family experience for children who have lived through abuse, neglect, and trauma. Our foster families model healthy relationships and coping skills and work with community resources to help improve the youth's functioning and promote their social and emotional well-being. SMART was founded on the principal that foster parents are professionals and an integral part of the child's treatment team.

We strive to support both the children and the foster parents. We offer weekly contact with our caseworker (in the home at least twice a month), 24/7 support and crisis intervention, professional training opportunities, monthly support groups (during the day or evening for your convenience), caseworker support at DHHS and school meetings, a daily tax-free stipend, and fun things, such as family bowling, roller skating, foster parent appreciation dinner, a Christmas party with great entertainment, etc. Our physical office is in North Windham. However, our catchment area covers many counties, including York, Cumberland, Androscoggin, southern Oxford, Sagadahoc, and southern Kennebec. If you wonder if you are in our catchment area, please call.

We have added numerous programs to enhance our foster care program and to help meet the needs of the surrounding communities. Those programs include: outpatient counseling for children, adolescents and adults; children's targeted case management (TCM); home and community based treatment (HCT); medication management; substance abuse and chemical dependency services; and veteran's services. Kinship Corner

"Kinship care is the full time care, nurturing and protection of children by relatives, members of their tribes or clans, godparents, stepparents, or any adult who has a kinship bond with a child. This definition is designed to be inclusive and respectful of cultural values and ties of affection. It allows a child to grow to adulthood in a family environment."

The number of children who are living with a grandparent or other relative has increased dramatically in the past two decades. More than 5 percent of all children in the United States live in such arrangements. Rising divorce rates, teenage pregnancy, child abuse or abandonment, and parental substance abuse, health problems, death, or incarceration are some of the factors linked to this trend.

AFFM is also aware of the increase in kinship care, as well as the importance of the role kin providers play in their relatives lives. AFFM is responding to at least 2 new kinship clients per week. AFFM is aware that 40% of DHHS placements are placed in kinship care and mindful of the need to have supports in place for kin providers.
