Acronyms and Terms in Child Protection: What do They Stand For?

- ⇒ C-2: Jeopardy Hearing is a hearing held on the child protection petition. In it, the court decides if the child is in jeopardy (put in danger). The child is then placed in full custody of the Department of Health and Human Services by a District Court. At the C-2 hearing the judge may also decide that the child is not unsafe and can go home.
- ⇒ Cease Reunification: A court decision based on the fact that the biological parents did not do what was required of them to make it safe for the child to return home. The Department is no longer required to provide reunification services for the purpose of the child returning to the biological parent's home.
- ⇒ C-3: Termination of Parental Rights (TPR) the court has terminated the rights of the child's parents. The child is free for adoption.

Child Welfare Voluntary Statuses

- ⇒ V-2 Children are placed in the Department's care. This is through a voluntary agreement between the birth parents and the Department and the parent's retain custody. This is not a common practice.
- ⇒ V-9 Young adults between the ages of 18-21 agree to be in DHHS extended care program. They are provided services to continue their education.
- ⇒ **Appeals:** Someone asks a different court to change the court's decision because they believe the court made a mistake. It is nearly always based on a legal technicality or shortcoming. Most courts are subject to appeals. The process can take several months to resolve.
- ⇒ **Disposition:** This is the decision about where the youth should live (such as in state custody or with a relative caretaker) It also states what the parents; DHHS must do to resolve the issues.
- ⇒ Guardian Ad Litem (GAL): A lawyer or a trained adult volunteer (Court Appointed Special Advocate CASA). They are appointed by the court to independently study, represent and protect the best interest of a child/children youth, in child protection cases and make recommendations to the court.
- ⇒ **Judicial Review:** A court review that looks at the progress of the parents and the youth. This helps decide the safest place for the child to live. There must be a judicial review at least every 6 months. At least every 12 months the judicial review must identify the permanent plan.

Avoiding Mealtime Meltdowns

Is mealtime difficult at your house? Does your child say "no" to most new foods? You are not alone. Many parents and caregivers say their children are picky eaters. WIC staff knows it can be hard to get kids to eat new foods and it's tempting to simply give kids the food they like.

WIC encourages the use of something known as the Division of Responsibilities, developed by Ellyn Satter. Parents and caregivers are responsible for the job of the "what, when and where" of feeding, while the children are responsible for the job of "how much and whether" to eat the food.

Your job in feeding your child is to give a variety of healthy foods (the what) at scheduled, regular meal and snack times throughout the day (the when) in a safe, pleasant setting (the where). Establishing scheduled meal and snack times allows children to trust that food will consistently be provided.

A child's task is to decide if he or she wants to eat at all during that scheduled meal or snack time (the whether) and how much of each food to eat (the how much). If your child does not want to eat what's been provided, teach him or her to remain sitting with the family until mealtime is done. Do not react to the child's decision not to eat. This teaches the child that a lack of eating does not result in extra attention. Avoid making a snack or meal that is different from what everyone else is eating. Children will eat the amounts they need and learn to enjoy the foods provided to all other family members.

If the child you are caring for has a medical condition or growth concerns, discuss feeding practices with your child's doctor.
