On behalf of the staff and board of directors, AFFM is pleased to share this inaugural annual report with the community. 2020 was a year that challenged everyone, but also illustrated so clearly the resilience and perseverance of the families and communities in Maine. In an unprecedented year in AFFM history, 2020 underscored the pressing needs that children and families face and sharpened AFFM's focus on what matters most to families.

As an organization, 2020 brought with it a tremendous amount of growth and expansion as AFFM moved to a new office in Bangor and welcomed new staff throughout Maine to better expand its reach statewide. AFFM continued to build upon its services by establishing a more robust statewide Kinship Navigator Program and elevating the support and information received by 1,963 kinship families throughout the state.

As AFFM continued to expand, staff and volunteers simultaneously shifted their service delivery methods to meet the new realities of supporting families during COVID. AFFM quickly moved its operations to remote-based support without compromising the quality of services. As a result, there are remote support groups in all corners of the state ready to meet the emotional and social support needs of caregivers. AFFM provided training options that have engaged 846 caregivers and professionals over the course of the year.

In these ever-changing times, one thing remains constant and that is AFFM's grassroots commitment to serving families wherever they are in their journey. In times like these, building supportive communities is key to AFFM's work. Helping families build a community around themselves is vital to achieving positive outcomes and this is why AFFM values community partnerships. AFFM utilizes partnerships to meet the diverse and changing needs of families. AFFM has been fortunate to have established partnerships with public and private agencies, foundations, trusts, for-profit and nonprofit entities.

Partnering with the University of Southern Maine, The University of Maine, and The Department of Health and Human Services has helped AFFM develop new training and support options for families and professionals across the wonderful state of Maine. Through continued partnerships with the Brookdale Foundation and the John T. Gorman Foundation, AFFM continues to expand services to families and meet critical needs.

As the organization continues to grow and adapt, AFFM celebrates the strengths of families in times of need and invites you to join us in supporting Maine's adoptive, foster, and kinship families as we look toward a bright and hopeful future.

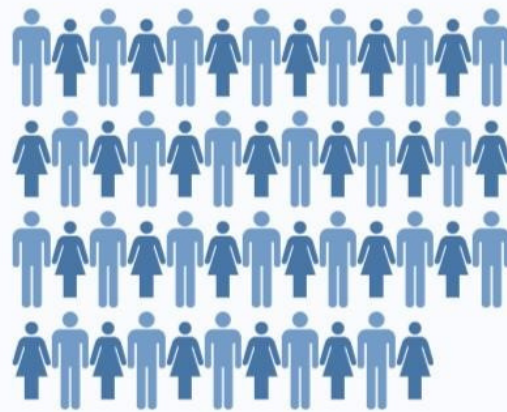

# Our Mission

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AFFM's Mission is to provide the training, guidance, knowledge, and resources needed to handle complex issues encountered by resource families as they open their hearts and homes to children in need.

AFFM's services are for all adoptive, foster, and kinship families. Child welfare is dependent upon a myriad of state and federal laws, rules, and regulations. Decisions concerning families and innocent children are rarely easy and are usually fraught with highly emotional issues. AFFM is dedicated to assisting families to help children find the security they deserve.

## What Families Tell Us:

- 92% of clients feel that AFFM's services are helpful in keeping a safe and stable home for youth in their care
- 79% of clients feel that AFFM's services enhanced their ability to care for youth
- 90% of clients report that AFFM was knowledgeable in responding to their questions and concerns
- 90% of clients feel that AFFM has been responsive to their questions or concerns

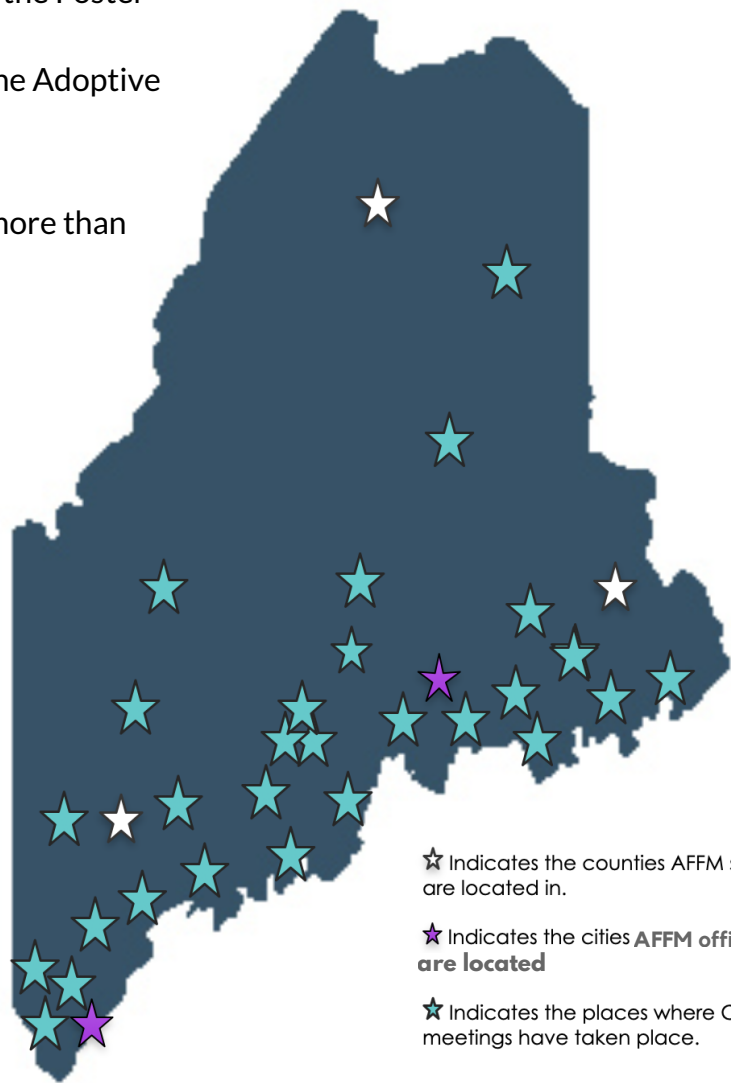
## Adding it Up:

- AFFM completed **958 supportive phone calls** and **1,742 email contacts with families**.
- AFFM has **2 offices, 3 remote locations, and 16 total staff**.
- AFFM has served a total of **3,450 families** including:
  - 1,963 families served via the Kinship Program
  - 1,447 families participating in the Foster Program
  - 573 families served through the Adoptive Program

\*to note that some families utilized more than one service at a time.

# Peer Support

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Our resource family mentor service pairs seasoned resource parents with new resource families to provide encouragement, guidance, and support. Mentors:

- Educate new families on how to partner effectively with DHHS
- Inform resource families on community supports and programs that will strengthen and preserve the family
- Support continuing education for new resource families
- Provides the direct link to AFFM and its services

We are always looking for mentor volunteers! If you are someone who is caring, responsible, and can serve as a trusted friend and guide to foster, adoptive and kinship families, we would love to hear from you!



C.A.R.E.S. meetings allow for families to make connections and form relationships with other families and support that can last a lifetime.

## What Families Tell Us:

- 92% of clients report feeling more understood after attending a CARES meeting.
- 52% of were able to help others through their CARES participation
- 89% of CARES clients felt more supported after attending
- 78% report feeling less isolated after attending a CARES meeting
- 85% report learning something new through CARES that can be used to support their family
- 78% report learning something new that they can use to support their own self-care as a result of participating in CARES





“Resource families face many unique challenges every day.

Having to anticipate the unknown can make difficult situations seem unbearable. The biggest need in our family is often to simply hear someone say, “I understand” or “I have seen that before.” AFFM’s mentorship program has provided just that for us on multiple occasions over the past few years. # Training

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AFFM provides training opportunities for families on a variety of topics. We continue to shape our training offerings to meet the needs of families.

We offer training topics including, but not limited to:

- Working Collaboratively with Birth Parents
- Allegation Prevention and Protocol Training
- Kinship Issues In Foster Care and Adoption
- Self-Care For Adoptive, Foster & Kinship Families
- The Special Role of Birth Children in Foster and Adoptive Placements
- Building Healthy Relationships
- Foster & Adoption Nutrition
- Resources for Success

In addition to our formal training, our Lending Library provides books and DVDs covering a wide range of topics related to issues of foster care, kinship, and adoption.

The library has items of interest for all ages, from very young children to grandparents, and library materials can also be used toward re-licensure hours for those families who are licensed foster care providers. Lending Library materials, mailed free of charge to families, provide convenient and private access to information. A certificate of training is available for those looking to use materials toward re-licensure.

Through a partnership with Foster Parent College (FPC), AFFM has been able to expand training offerings giving Maine foster parents access to FPC's extensive catalog of online interactive training sessions covering practical parenting strategies, behavioral issues, and emotional disorders in children. Licensed foster parents can use FPC training credits toward their annual training requirements.



## Adding it Up:

- AFFM offered a variety of 87 unique training sessions in 2020
- 53 out of the 87 unique training sessions were offered through the Foster Parent College partnership
- Our Foster Parent College partnership has resulted in 796 people trained and a total of 13,108 hours of training.
- 30 families accessed the lending library in 2020

## What Trainees Tell Us:

Across all training in 2020, a total of 104 individuals responded to the training evaluations.

- 95% of trainees report that training content was helpful and 93% say the content was relevant to their needs.
- 96% report that the trainer connected materials presented to real-life situations.
- 92% agreed that training was very helpful to increasing one’s ability to provide a safe/permanent home.

# The Kinship Program

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AFFM knows kinship relationships can often be stressful. As a neutral observer with years of experience, AFFM knows how to assist families with meeting their basic needs, systems navigation, family dynamics, child behaviors, and a variety of other situations faced by kinship families. This program provided direct support to 1,963 kinship families throughout Maine by identifying resources, supports, and services needed for kinship families and working collaboratively with other organizations to meet those needs. The focus of the navigator program includes community outreach and mobilization, webpage and resource guide, training for kinship caregivers, a respite program, and warmline telephone support for families.

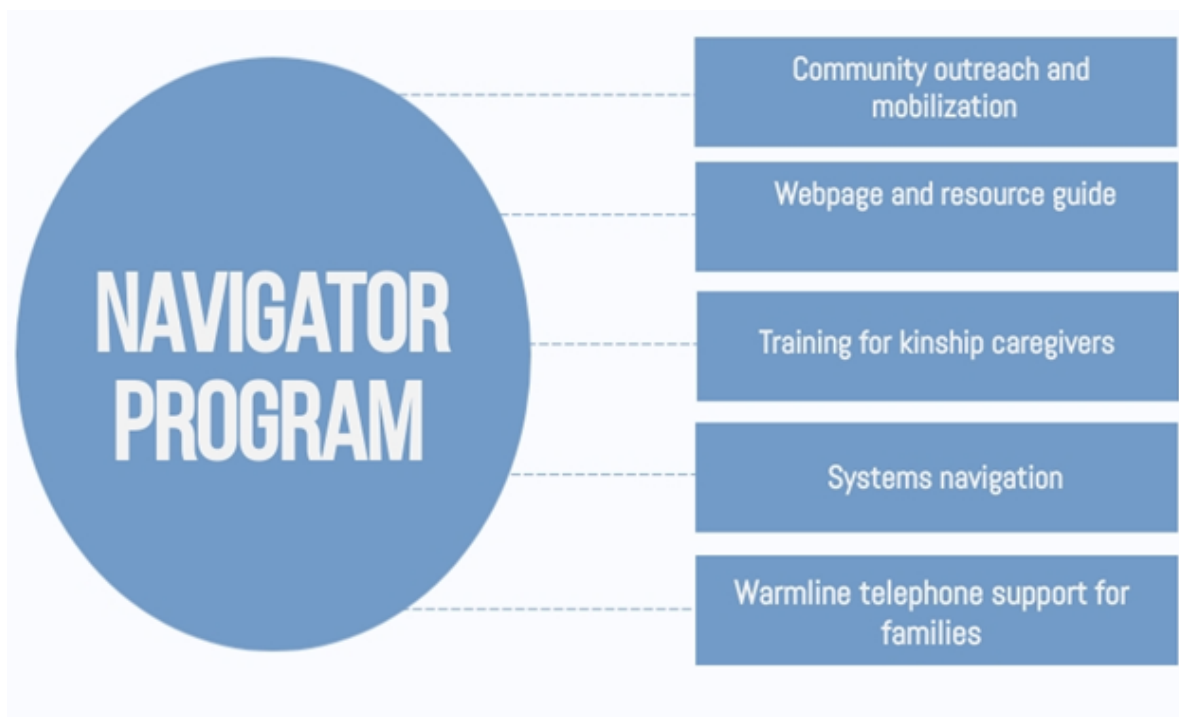

# Family

The focus of the navigator program includes community outreach and mobilization, webpage and resource guide, training for kinship caregivers, a respite program, referrals, and warmline telephone support for families. Through a partnership with the Gorman Foundation, AFFM has been able to provide emergency direct assistance to 59 families with immediate financial and resource needs. Emergency financial assistance from this fund helped cover the cost of utility bills, heating, food insecurities, beds, and cribs. Of the families that received financial assistance, the majority of families served are referred to a variety of supports that can continue to help families meet their needs including WIC nutrition support, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), SNAP food stamp program, General Assistance, housing vouchers, Social Security offices, DHHS offices, discount clothing, and furniture thrift stores, food banks, cooperative extension food programs & community gardens. Through the generosity of The Gorman Foundation, these funds have helped to meet immediate needs and fill resource gaps for families.

Through support from Maine's Office of Child and Family Services, AFFM has continued to serve as Maine's statewide Kinship Navigator Program. Through this partnership, AFFM has been able to develop resources intended to identify and support families providing informal kinship care. This program provided direct support to 1,963 kinship families throughout Maine by identifying resources, supports, and services needed for kinship families and working collaboratively with other organizations to meet those needs. The focus of the navigator program includes community outreach and mobilization, webpage and resource guide, training for kinship caregivers, a respite program, and warmline telephone support for families.

## What Kinship Navigator Families Tell Us:

- 100% feel AFFM's services have helped in keeping a safe and stable home for the youth in their care.
- 100% feel AFFM's services have helped support the wellbeing of the youth in their care.
- 100% feel AFFM's services have helped them to better handle their caregiving role.
- The majority of caregivers (91%) report that they would recommend AFFM services to other kinship families
- The majority (91%) of caregivers report being satisfied with the services they have received from AFFM.
- The majority (91%) report knowing more about programs and supports that are available to them and that they are able to access the services and help they need.

## Adding it up:

- Through the Gorman Grant in 2020:
  - 34 families were provided referral information to other supports and resources
  - 44 families utilized the emergency services
  - 29 families indicated that they applied or received support from the services referred by AFFM
  - Of the 44 families who utilized services, 28 families reported having an average annual household income of \$16,135

# Partnerships

We encourage families to build resources and support around themselves. AFFM recognizes the importance of working on a systems-level to make sure those supports are available when families need them. AFFM is involved in numerous partnerships with statewide and national organizations and groups to meet this goal. Examples of the partnerships that help us meet family needs include:

## Partnerships that Give Resource Families a Voice:

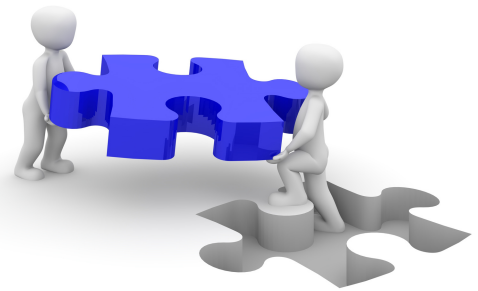
- *Maine Child Welfare Advisory Panel*
  - A collaborative task force comprised of private citizens and professionals across disciplines focused on handling child abuse and neglect. The panel is in place to make sure the state system is protecting and providing for children, youth, and families
- *Justice for Children Task Force*
  - A collaborative, cross-disciplinary task force aimed to improve safety, permanency, and well-being for children in the State of Maine child welfare system. The task force is composed of representatives from legislative, judicial, executive branches, advocates, and other citizens.
- *Family First Prevention Services Act Planning Work Group*
  - A working group created through legislation of the Federal Family First Prevention Services Act. The act is committed to keeping children safe, strengthening families, and if safety permits; reducing the need for foster care.



## Statewide Coordination/Building Service

### Connections for Families:

- *Maine Alliance for Family Organizations (MAFO)*
  - A statewide association created to better serve families of children with disabilities and special health care needs. MAFO recognizes the important value of listening to family's voices, concerns, and overall input when providing services and support. Through its partnership with MAFO, AFFM is supporting a recent SAMHSA grant that is growing Home and Community-based Treatment (HCT) services in rural areas bringing services directly to families when and where they need them.
- *Family-Focused Treatment Association (FFTA)*
  - The FFTA is a nonprofit organization that was created to develop, promote, and support the treatment provided in foster care. FFTA provides services not only for foster care treatment but addresses the overall needs of children in foster care.
- *YMCAs around the state (Bangor, Portland, Waterville)*
  - A nonprofit organization that provides health and wellness opportunities for individuals in the community. YMCA is committed to strengthening communities through empowering individuals and inspiring action.



### Raising Awareness on a National Level:

- *Generations United Grandfamilies Advisory Group (GU)*
  - Generations United's National Center on Grandfamilies functions to create supportive programs and laws for grandfamilies, and improve the accessibility to these services. GU's Grandfamilies advisory group conducts advocacy at a federal level and provides support at the state level to organizations and advocates.
- *The Federal Advisory Committee on Grandparents Raising Grandchildren*
  - An advisory council established to support grandparents raising grandchildren. The panel identifies, promotes, coordinates, and passes on information and resources to the public regarding best child practices, and other related child care guidance.
- *North American Council on Adoptable Children (NACAC)*
  - The NACAC educates, advocates, and supports adoptive families. NACAC advocates for policies and practices that improve children's chances of having a permanent family. NACAC aims to provide advocacy and support in order for adoptive families to thrive in their environment.



## Partnership with the UMO:

- The University of Maine has been a longstanding partner in AFFM's work. Through this partnership, we have had masters-level social work students assist us with research to strengthen our outreach efforts; hosted internships through the UM School of Social Work to better serve our families; and document our impact and tell our story through an evaluation partnership with the UMaine Center on Aging. A recent story featured in *Children's Voice* magazine details our nearly 20 year history of collaboration



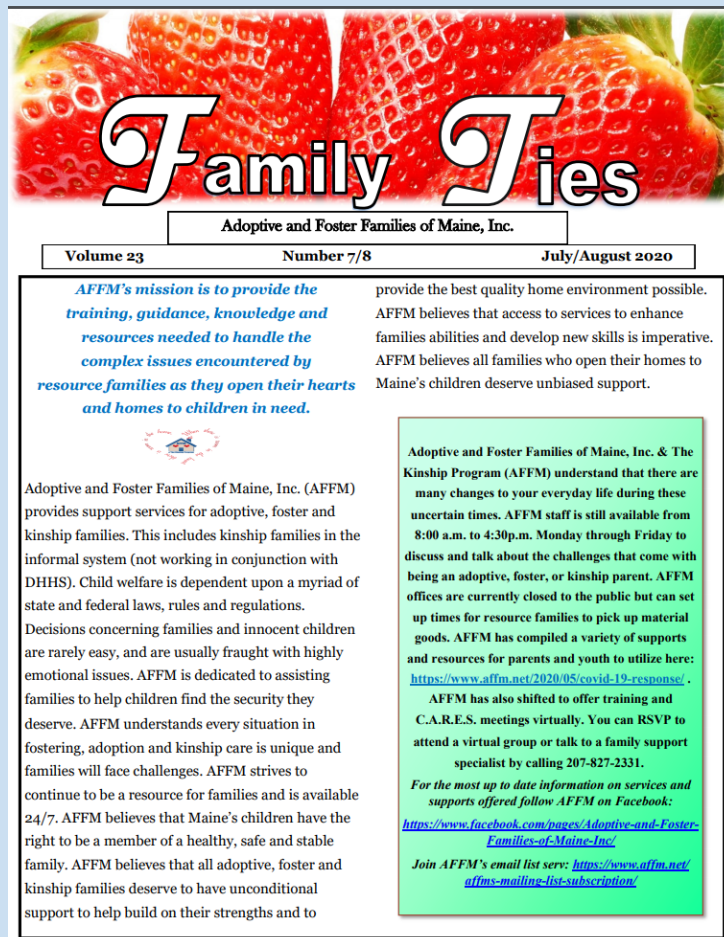
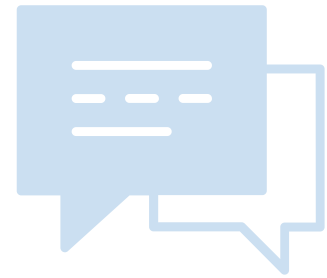

# Outreach

With the physical distance guidelines of 2020, AFFM focused on creating social connections by utilizing technology and sticking with its roots. We updated our website, started an Instagram account, created private Facebook C.A.R.E.S. groups, and increased social media reach. Virtual spaces allowed for families to participate in much-needed self-care opportunities such as having coffee with friends, guided painting, and more.

Children from across the state tuned in to have story time with our family support specialists who also enjoyed having some of the youth share their favorite story.

Among the children's favorite was their story time with Mr. and Mrs. Claus. Knowing that not all families have the means for internet access nor prefer the virtual world, AFFM Staff and volunteers helped continue grassroots efforts by hand folding and labeling their bi-monthly Family Ties newsletters which was sent to more than 3,500 families, businesses, and organizations.



## Adding it up:

- 286 people started following AFFM on Facebook for a total of 3,518 followers.
- 289 people liked AFFM's Facebook page for a total of 3,548 likes.
- AFFM had a total reach of 24,575

# Material Goods

For many of our families, the financial cost of keeping children clothed throughout the year can be a challenge, especially as children grow and the seasons change. AFFM has been fortunate to have many community partners who provide donated goods for families to utilize from clothing, bedding, toys, books, and hygiene products; to beds, dressers, etc. Throughout clothing closets and our private AFFM Swap Facebook page, we provide families with those unexpected and ongoing necessities.

Our discount card program allows families to take advantage of a wide array of discounts from local business partners. From window repair to discounts for restaurants to family fun events, every little bit can help even if it is 15% off a purchase or \$5 off an entrance fee.



## What Families Tell Us:

- The majority of families served (93%) report that the AFFM discount card was helpful to them and their families.

- 186 youth received backpacks, filled with school supplies through the Ready Set Go to Learn Program
